#### CHANGES IN SKY & TEL HANDLING--AND A PROBABLE INCREASE IN CLUB DUES

As anticipated, Sky Publishing Corporation has increased its subscription prices to the Prairie Astronomy Club, effective January 1, from the present \$8.00 per year to \$9.00. In past years the club has generally maintained a \$4.00 margin between the subscription price and club dues, which has equalled the one-year non-membership subscription rate to Sky & Telescope. #### OBSERVING CHAIRMAN'S REPORT ...

This month, we start observing in Cassiopeia. This constellation with galactic seems to be blessed clusters. Those with large telescopes should have no trouble finding NGC 7654, M52. To find it, go on a rough line from Alpha through Beta on towards 4 Cassiopeia, or about the same distance from Alpha through Beta beyond Beta. The cluster is rather faint, so search carefully.

There are a profusion of small clusters scattered throughout the constellation, so this is a good place to sweet at low power. About one degree east and a bit north of delta Cassiopeia is M103, a small cluster with a triple star near its center. In nearby Perseus, H and Chi Persei are perhaps the best pair of clusters in the sky. Located 412 degrees west and one north of Eta Persei, the clusters are rich in bright stars that show color in larger telescopes.

After a quick look at M31 near Nu Andromedae, try a more difficult object, NGC 205, now renamed M110. It should be visible in smaller telescopes, except for its low surface brightness. It is less than a degree north of the nucleus of M31, and looks very much to the eye as it appears in most photographs, an elongated patch of light bright at the center, but gradually fading towards the edge. It is a prime example of an elliptical galaxy.

Moving a bit southeast, we find another Messier galaxy, M33. It is best to find this large dim galaxy with a good pair of binoculars, due to the low surface brightness. Look about 312 degrees west and less than one degree north of the star Alpha Triangulii and use the lowest mag nification possible. It shows some details in telescopes of six inches or more in aperture with some of the spiral arm structure showing as faint knots of light in the haze surrounding the nucleus. However, you should look (with a moderate telescope) less than & degree northeast of the nucleus of the galaxy for a small 11th magnitude spot of light near a few stars. For awhile, this object had both your observing chairman and your program chairman thinking it was a new comet. It was NGC 601, a gigantic region of glowing hydrogen gas ionized by supergiant stars in M33. It is almost 900 lightyears across (Continued on Page 4)

Tel's price to "civilians" has been \$12, the same as club membership dues.)

Now, however, Sky & Telescope's cover subscription price has increased to \$14.00. Since the strains of inflation are attacking your club as much as everyone else, it is perhaps time to consider increasing our club margin to \$5.00 over the group plan price, which would still allow us to offer membership and the magazine at the same price the magazine would cost alone to non- members. You may expect a motion to that effect at the October meeting from your moneyconscious treasurer:

In another development, Sky Publishing has revealed a policy that was unknown to the PAC officers, and one which could virtually eliminate the "holding pattern" newsletter-only subscription. Anyone who wishes to join the club, but who already has a subscription to Sky & Telescope will receive a pro rated refund of their remaining subscription from Sky Publishing Corporation upon payment of dues to the Prairie Astronomy Club. (Naturally, if you have only a few issues remaining, the best thing to do is simply let your subscription run out, then join the club.) In the past, as you know, we have established a non-member newsletter-only sub scription that allowed potential members to stay in touch with the club while awaiting termination of their

Sky & Tel subscriptions. At best, this was an awkward situation: truly interested people were put on "hold", unable to vote or participate in club decisions merely because they didn't want to have two subscriptions to the magazine. Allowing them to join the club without a Sky & Tel subscription would have violated our agreement with Sky Publishing. We believe the pro-rated refund on pre-existing subscriptions is an excellent solution to this problem, and recommend it strongly for newsletter subscribers who wish to be full -fledged club members. (Naturally, subscriptions to the newsletter will continue to be available, but costs are rising, and this service will likely become more expensive next year.)
