Observer's Report...

Start your summer observing with M102, one of the "added" Messier galaxies, located about three degrees south and just over two degrees west of iota Draconis. It is a bright fuzzy spindle of light with a broad middle and a very narrow dark lane which is probably visible only with very large telescopes even though the galaxy itself can be seen with a 2.4 inch refractor.

Be sure and look at the heautiful olobular cluster M92, located six degrees due north of 69 Herculis. It shows stars well in a six inch and it is beautiful in my eight. The remaining olobular, NGC 6229 is somewhat smaller and although bright shows no stars in my eight inch with any certainty. It is almost directly between 42 and 52 Herculis and can be seen with a four inch telescope.

In Ophiuchus, look at the large and beautiful open cluster NGC I.4665 located just over a degree northeast of Beta. It is an especially nice cluster for binoculars or the small telescope as it contains many bright stars arranged in a long loose cigar shaped area.

Down in Scorpius, look for the nice globular cluster M80, about a degree and a half northwest of omicron. It shows a mass of tightly packed stars in my eight inch with the center only partially resolved. Also in Scorpius is M4, a large and somewhat loose globular about a degree west of Antares. Its central mass of stars is almost lens shaped with a spherical outer halo of very faint stars.

In Libra, the globular NGC 5897 can be something of a challenge located one and one half degrees southeast of rota. It is large and rather faint with only a few stars showing in an eight inch reflector.

Those with large binoculars or large richfield telescopes should try to see the North American Nebula just over two decrees southeast of Deneb in central Cyonus. I found it vaquely visible in my eight inch with "Mexico" ad "Central Canada" being the most prominant features.
